
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A Message from the Pastor

Election Year 2024

As I am writing this article, this week, I opened the news to a report about a second assassination attempt on one of the two political candidates for president. Just as religion can produce zealots committed to their cause so much that nothing else matters and the ends justify the means, so can political ideologies. We must refrain from our bas-



er instincts and remember what it means to be God's people first and foremost – a people committed to loving God and neighbor.

Although I am cautious to speak on something as political as an election (I'm not sure there's anything more political than the practice of choosing elected leaders), the danger is to remain silent and give no guidance in how our faith informs our civic life.

I will state up front, it is not the pastor's role to be partisan. I will not tell you how to vote or even if you should vote at all. After all, our primary identity is not citizens of the US or any country, rather as Paul reminds us in the scriptures, we are citizens of heaven (Philippians 3:20), the kingdom of God.

However, we live in this world and are called to live out our faith in all aspects. Our faith is not meant to be compartmentalized as one thing among many, rather as children of God we look to God in how we should live with one another.

Therefore, I offer up this warning to you. The political rhetoric will get nastier as we approach November 5th. The powers that be will try and pit people against each other as if it's a winner take all scenario. In all likelihood you will never meet those two people, and yet the relationships you have cultivated over a lifetime can suffer over this period.

What would it be like to go the opposite direction of the vitriol—to intentionally be more loving?

Living in outrage is outrageous. Living in love is the way of Jesus. When November 6th rolls around, the world will keep spinning. God's mission to bring reconciliation and wholeness to our world will continue.

The political culture says achieve power.

Jesus says the real power is laying down his life.

The political culture says defeat your enemy no matter the cost. Jesus says pray for your enemies.

The political culture says demonize your opponents. Jesus casts out the demons and humanizes each person.

A Message from the Deacon

Dear siblings in Christ at Peace and St. Andrew,

One of the most challenging aspects of being a rostered minister in the ELCA is the transition from one call to another. It is an emotional time of discerning and making difficult decisions while being open to where the Holy Spirit might be leading. I am writing to share with you that I have been offered and accepted a call to serve Calvary Lutheran Church in Morganton, North Carolina as their Deacon for Faith Formation and Outreach. Morganton is a small city between Asheville and Charlotte in western North Carolina. My call will also include serving 1/3 time helping lead the NC Synod's Children, Youth, and Family ministries.

As most of you know, I served for 20 years in the South Carolina Synod before coming to Texas, and I also spent a great deal of time with congregations and camps in North Carolina. This new call brings me back to familiar places and colleagues. It brings me much closer to my family, my mom, my sister, and my son, Zack, who all live in Georgia within easy driving distance. With Grace eventually moving to the US, this was a very important part of my decision to accept this new call, to be settled close to family.

When I made myself available for call through the ELCA Churchwide office, I knew that I would only leave my current call here at Peace and St. Andrew if it was the right call and in the right part of the country. I knew it was definitely a small window of possibility. I also knew that such a call might not exist or become available. The plus side for me has been knowing that I could remain right here doing what I do with all of you and be completely happy for many more years.

When I first shared the possibility of this call (and move) with Pastor Jake and Pastor Chris in August, I told them that if I could just pick up these two congregations and bring you all with me, I'd be delighted to continue as your Deacon for Faith Formation until my retirement. I shared the same heartfelt sentiment with I met with both congregation councils via Zoom while I was in Japan to notify them that the possibility of this new call was imminent.

The five years that I have served Peace and St. Andrew have been deeply rewarding for me on so many levels. Together we have seen a lot of changes in our communities and in the world, especially navigating through the COVID pandemic. Through all of those changes, I've always felt very blessed to be a part of two congregations filled with people (YOU!) who share a deep passion for the gospel and a courageous openness to listen to and follow the Holy Spirit. As disciples of Jesus, we are called to witness to the love of God in the midst of a hurting world that needs this good news now more than ever. We will continue to share in that ministry together, albeit now from different parts of the country.

My last Sunday here in Texas will be Sunday, October 6th. I am going to split my four remaining Sundays between Peace (9/15, 10/6) and St. Andrew (9/22, 9/29). I welcome your calls, emails, and texts, and I will make myself available to meet with people between now and when I move. Saying goodbye is never easy, especially with so many wonderful memories of sharing in ministry and friendship with all of you. I go to North Carolina filled with joy and thanksgiving to God for you! I ask for your prayers as I begin this transition into the next chapter in my life. I will also be in prayer for all of you and for both congregations, confident that God will continue to work wonderous things through you.

Dear Peace Lutheran Church,

We are excited to introduce this year's stewardship campaign, "Grace in Action." As followers of Christ, we recognize that every gift we receive is a manifestation of God's abundant grace. Just as God freely gives, we are called to live out our faith by putting grace into action—serving, sharing, and giving generously.



Let's begin with the word grace. It's one of Peace's four core values, and it happens to be the value that everything hinges upon, because grace fundamentally is a gift from God. The thing about grace is that it's God's lens for how God sees us—that there is nothing that God wouldn't give us to us, because that love overflows.

You cannot earn grace, you cannot buy it, you cannot be worthy of it. Instead, God simply says, I love you and I give you this love freely even when we don't deserve it.

The thing about grace is that when we receive this gift, it's transformative. Because when you boil it down, you catch a glimpse of God's unconditional love. And once you receive that gift, you can begin to let go of that need to achieve it by your own means.

So why grace in action? The sheer grace of God moves us to be gracious in our own lives. Jesus once told a parable about a king who forgave an insurmountable debt, but the man who was given a new life immediately went and saw someone who owed him a small sum. He proceeded to shake him down and do the very opposite of what the king had shared with him. That's not transformation. Grace is action is a way of life in which we take on the heart of God who fully loves, forgives, and reconciles us to the wholeness of relationship with him.

Grace in action, therefore, is the opportunity to join God's heart of generosity and let go of ourselves. When we get lost in grace, we begin to not worry about gaining and achieving everything in life, rather we look with graceful eyes to share and bless as God does.

Where are we in the great story of the Bible?



CREATION AND FALL

God creates the heavens and the earth and it is very good. Human disobedience leads to a fallen and broken world. God uses Noah to preserve humanity through the flood.



THE FAMILY OF FAITH c. 2000 BC

God promises to bless the world through the family of Abraham and Sarah by making them a numerous people and giving them the land of Canaan. Jacob's 12 children inherit the promise.



ISRAEL'S EXODUS AND CALL c. 1400 BC

After settling in Egypt, the family becomes a nation. They are enslaved for 400 years until God delivers them through Moses. In the Sinai wilderness, God covenants to be Israel's God.



TRIBES AND JUDGES c. 1300 BC

After 40 years, Joshua leads Israel into the promised land. In each generation God raises up people to lead the tribes, called 'Judges.' But each generation is more disobedient than the last.



THE UNITED KINGDOM c. 1000 BC

The people ask God for a King. The first King, Saul is disobedient. His successor is David, a man after God's heart. David's son, Solomon, prays for wisdom and builds the temple.



KINGS AND PROPHETS c. 900-722 BC

The kingdom splits into two: Israel in the North and Judah in the South. When the people are disobedient, God raises up prophets to call them back to the covenant.



JUDAH'S FALL AND EXILE 721-538 BC

After the fall of Israel to Assyria, Judah is warned to reform their ways or they will fall to Babylon. Because they are disobedient, Babylon invades Jerusalem and the people are sent into exile.



THE NATION OF HOPE 532-334 BC

After 70 years, Babylon is conquered by Persia and the new King allows the the captives to go home. They rebuild the temple and compile the writings that become the Bible.



COMING AND BIRTH 333 BC - 0 YEAR

Through 200 years of oppression, under Greek then Roman rule, God's people cry out for a king who will set them free. Then in Bethlehem, Jesus is born.

Mission Endowment Fund Grant Applications

Did you know that Peace Lutheran has a Mission Endowment Fund and that grants are given annually to extend God's ministry to our community and beyond? It does, and the application deadline for 2025 funding is fast approaching. Any application requests to be considered for 2025 fund disbursement must be received in the church office by October 31, 2024.

The fund is designed to further the missions of Peace Lutheran beyond the allocations of the general operating budget. Grants are funded from the interest earned on contributions to the fund. Grant application forms are available from either the church office or church website. The forms can be filled out and returned to the church office by the October 31st deadline for consideration by the Mission Endowment Fund committee.

Our October Mission Spotlight is Crisis Center of Comal County


The Crisis Center of Comal County provides emergency shelter and services for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and women experiencing homelessness.

These services include licensed counselors for clients of all ages through individual and group counseling. Legal advocacy takes clients through the steps necessary to obtain protective orders, affidavits and filing police reports.

The Crisis Center works with their clients to secure safe, stable housing and accompanies them to medical, legal and criminal service providers if needed.
