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A Message from the Pastor

What Are You Reading?

46% of Americans said they did not read a single book in 2023. About half of the country has not read a book. That is not to say people are not reading; however, they are reading things like social media posts and scrolling through quick images.

One of the increasing problems I see in our culture is that we have lost the art of deeply reading and engrossing ourselves in books. Reading builds language and shares concepts and transmits ideas that connect our brain synapses to remain sharp and build understanding.

When I think of how much we fail to understand one another, I think reading is a big part of that problem. After all, we are people of the Book, the Bible. Our faith stems from the Word that was revealed and passed down in story form for generations.

Some of my favorite books in 2024:

How to Know a Person: The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Being Deeply Seen

by David Brooks

All around us are people who feel invisible, unseen, misunderstood. In How to Know a Person, Brooks sets out to help us do better, posing questions that are essential for all of us: If you want to know a person, what kind of attention should you cast on them? What kind of conversations should you have? What parts of a person's story should you pay attention to?

Driven by his trademark sense of curiosity and his determination to grow as a person, Brooks draws from the fields of psychology and neuroscience and from the worlds of theater, philosophy, history, and education to present a welcoming, hopeful, integrated approach to human connection. How to Know a Person helps readers become more understanding and considerate toward others, and to find the joy that comes from being seen. Along the way it offers a possible remedy for a society that is riven by fragmentation, hostility, and misperception.

The act of seeing another person, Brooks argues, is profoundly creative: How can we look somebody in the eye and see something large in them, and in turn, see


something larger in ourselves? How to Know a Person is for anyone searching for connection, and yearning to be understood.

The answer lies in Jesus' first words as he began his public ministry: "metanoia." This profound concept encompasses repentance





as a radical paradigm shift and reorientation, inviting us to perceive the world through God's eyes and bringing transformation in our own lives, the organizations we lead, and the world around us.



Think Again: The Power of Knowing What You Don't Know by Adam Grant

Intelligence is usually seen as the ability to think and learn, but in a rapidly changing world, there's another set of cognitive skills that might matter more: the ability to rethink and unlearn. In our daily lives, too many of us favor the comfort of conviction over the discomfort of doubt. We listen to opinions that make us feel good, instead of ideas that make us think hard. We see disagreement as a threat to our egos, rather than an opportunity to learn. We surround ourselves with people who agree with our conclusions, when we should be gravitating toward those who challenge our thought process. The result is that our beliefs get brittle long before our bones. We think too much like preachers defending our sacred beliefs, prosecutors proving the other side wrong, and politicians campaigning for approval—and too little like scientists searching for truth. Intelligence is no



cure, and it can even be a curse: being good at thinking can make us worse at rethinking. The brighter we are, the blinder to our own limitations we can become.

Phase 5 - Grass tilled for brick inlay


Phase 6 - Informational Kiosk installed

Spirit of Sharing (SOS) Food Bank is our February Mission Spotlight. A single church in 1988 addressed hunger in our community and it has grown into many other local churches and service organizations stepping up to provide support to our food insecure neighbors. SOS is strictly run by volunteers, there is no paid staff and the only source of income and food is through charitable donations, both private and corporate.

SOS is dedicated to preventing the residents of our community from experiencing hunger. They fill the gap with emergency food assistance or providing a monthly food allotment program.

Peace has partnered with SOS faithfully through the years with a dedicated group that volunteers the Second Monday of the Month from 1 to 4pm. Nonperishable food items are also collected in our "Ugly Shopping Cart" located in our Narthex. Take advantage of grocery store sales and pick up canned goods, pasta, or peanut butter to stock SOS shelves.
