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A Message from the Pastor

Four Key Pivots for a Changing Landscape

At the end of January, Peace's leadership teams met together to discern and envision God's call for the coming year.


We do this practice every year to set the stage for where we are going. Otherwise, it's too easy to get caught in the minutia of daily ministry which pulls a congregation every which way.

I have found that there is always an vast array of work to do in our life together as people of faith. Compassion, proclamation, teaching, healing, blessing, outreach, service, community-building, administration, communication, crisismanagement,... the list could keep going.

The question we ask is, "What is God calling us to do right now?"

It might be tempting to zoom in with specifics and start naming programs and events. But part of our retreat time is to resist that temptation and zoom out in order to see the big picture before we start making the plans.

This year we are leaning into four key pivots identified by Luther Seminary through their FaithLead organization. For the next four months, I'll walk with you through each pivot.



<u>Pitfall #1</u> Assume that a voluntary association model can be fixed

The culture has moved from the Age of Association to the Age of Authenticity. Individuals have become skeptical of, detached from, and even hostile toward voluntary associations, including church.

In his seminal work, <u>Bowling Alone</u>, American political scientist Robert Putnam argues that the decline of

social capital, leads to a host of societal ills, from declining mental health to diminished happiness. Putnam highlights how Americans have increasingly stopped participating in traditional forms of group membership, such as civic organizations, religious groups, and social clubs. Rather than bowling together in leagues, we are bowling alone. The same can be said of church, scouts, PTAs, and a myriad of volunteer associations.

The networks of relationships and norms of reciprocity have significantly declined in American society since the 1960s, largely due to factors like technological changes, suburbanization, and generational shifts. Putnam argues that this decline in joining and engaging with organizations has contributed to a broader erosion of prosociality, diminishing both individual connections and the strength of community bonds, weakening the social fabric and undermining the collective well-being of communities.

Pivot #1 From fixing to listening, discerning, and experimenting

Many congregations and leaders are tempted to expend their energy trying to fix inherit-


ed structures in order to reverse the decline of institutional affiliation, participation, and resources. Christ's local church will endure, but there is no easy fix for voluntary association institutional structures. In this in-between time of overlap between the Age of Association and the Age of Authenticity, faith leaders need a nuanced approach:

On the one hand, faith leaders cannot simply abandon the faithful members who have supported the Age of Association model of church, for whom it remains meaningful. And on the other hand, faith leaders cannot expect the inherited model to work in most places going forward. This model will not be the way that churches reach neighbors who live in the framework of the Age of Authenticity.

So what do we do?

Pivot 1: A pivot in Posture

From fixing to listening, discerning, and experimenting



- 1. Let go of the urge to fix everything and restore it to the way things were. That world is diminishing and so are the returns in strategies that focus solely on it.
- 2. Practice presence, curiosity, and deep listening. The bad news is that the age of association is dwindling; however, the good news is that people are seeking authentic, meaningful relationships. We need to reclaim the art of deep listening with our neighbors and connecting with their hopes and dreams even as we name Jesus as the one who brings life and trust in the Spirit to work in our holy conversations.
- 3. Move into a model of experimentation. As any epochal shift throughout history has taught us, there is a liminal space of learning that takes place. Many things may not work, but some things will. Our openness to try new things will lead to new discoveries. And it goes back to deep listening and then responding to those needs.

I'm curious to what the Holy Spirit is doing in our world? Let's be curious together.

Thrivent Choice



March Mission Spotlight



Family Promise is a nationwide program that has been active in the Greater New Braunfels area since 2012. This unique approach to homelessness depends on congregations, individuals, and corporations to provide family units with the tools necessary to secure stable housing.

In the over 12 years of serving the New Braunfels area, over 21,000 bed nights of shelter have been provided, 102 families (268 individuals) have received services, 56 families (168 individuals) have graduated and secured housing and 32 families have received donated vehicles upon graduation.

Services that are provided to single or dual-parent families include helping clients apply for assistance they are qualified for, attain education for better employment opportunities, help navigate the legal system if applicable, provide medical care and/or therapy if needed, childcare so that the parent(s) are able to find employment.

The Family Promise model is a three-pronged approach to meet the needs of their clients. Prevention is the first level of assistance that is available to clients who are struggling. The assistance is short-term and can be payment of utility bills, a month's rent or perhaps buying gasoline. It is a stop-gap to keep a vulnerable family from losing their home.

Shelter is the model that Peace is actively involved in. There are currently 9 congregations providing week long rotations where the families are fed and housed in a church home. Families typically are in the program 6 to 9 months before graduation. We have 6 opportunities to serve families in 2025, our next rotation starts Sunday, April 27.

Stabilization follows the families after they have graduated and have secure housing. They help with financial planning, and offer support as the families navigate independent living.

Sunday, March 23 is Mission Spotlight Sunday, a dedicated offering will be collected for Family Promise. Other service opportunities include participating during Peace rotation weeks by providing a meal, visiting with our families while they are in our care, spending the night, or donation of non perishable food items for grab and go breakfasts.
